

Identifying the skills needed for coproduction by looking at some of the values and behaviours commonly used when coproducing...



These can then be broken down further into skill areas.

Identifying the skills needed for coproduction – skill areas

Coproduction values broken down into some of the common skill areas 'Golden Skills' used in coproduction

Planning & project management

Knowledge about coproduction and involvement approaches

Communication

Service transformation & change management

Facilitation

Soft skills

Accessibility, health inequalities knowledge

Personal self-awareness & reflection skills



How do you build skills in coproduction? And what is the impact?

Offer learning resources -

Help people reflect on their current skill levels so they can learn and improve

Share coproduction stories and case studies

Create a wider organisational or team culture

- Embed coproduction into existing approaches
- Give people time to take part in training
- Create a safe space to try new things- and learn from things that did not go well

Build relationships and networks of people working in the same way.



Some of the impacts of building skills in coproduction:

Consistency of approach

Improved services

More coproduction

Innovation and creativity

Shared knowledge & best practice

Better connections and networks

Assessing coproduction skills to support development
