

### **Supporting GBTQ+ Dads**



More than 1.3 million people in England and Wales identify as lesbian, gay, or bisexual (2021) census.

And 262,000 people (0.5%) said their gender identity was different from their sex registered at birth.

6.9% of 16-24 year-olds identified as LGB compared to just 0.4% of over 75s

It's estimated that around 25% of adoptions nationally are to LGBT couples or solo parents.

Surrogacy widely misunderstood. Parents under pressure to justify choices

Trans Birthing Dads often isolated and lacking in role models

Lack of awareness of support need in Health care systems

Lack of support for adopters when proposed matches fail

General lack of research







#### **Key Findings**

Micro-aggressions/invalidations and isolation

The pressure to be perfect – Lots of dimensions

Genetic link, partner relationship and telling your family story

Trans birthing identity is varied, and assumptions need to be challenged

A strong desire to protect children's autonomy in gender expression
